Samuel A. Green Jr. said in a written statement that he was "particularly disturbed" to see the Rev. Daniel Berrigan, his brother the Rev. Philip Berrigan, and George Mische denied parole while persons sentenced for such crimes as armed robbery "make parole rather easily."

"No matter how often I read through our file on the case," Green said, "I cannot bring myself to believe that the quiet, zealous dedication of these nine justifies incarceration any longer unless there is something I and the public do not know about their adjustments to imprisonment."

The two Berrigans and Mische, along with six others, were sentenced in federal court to prison terms ranging from 2 to 31/2 years on charges
