"... But maybe the American Civil Liberties Union will tell us that they were all tourists who just happened to be on the streets and bridges at 6 o'clock in the morning," his text suggests.

Recalling that Sen. Kennedy referred to Mayday activities as "civil disobedience in the American tradition of Thoreau and Martin Luther King," Juttice's No. 2 official says a minute-by-minute check of police logs reveals protesters committing crimes ranging from spreading nails on the streets to crashing a truck across an intersection. He also says that 39 policemen were injured and private citizens attacked, and asserts:

"To compare this vicious and wanton mob attack on Washington with the civil diso-bedience of Thoreau and Martin Luther King is to insult the memory of those men who stood for peaceful nonviolent protest."

Critics of the government, whom he labeled "sidewalk superintendents," make revealing omissions in their criticisms, he believes.
