DENVER, March 28-A doctor for lobbyist Dita D. Beard has complained that she was interviewed by a journalist in her hospital room here late Thursday night "without my knowledge or consent."

Dr. Louis M. Radetsky, the osteopath treating Mrs. Beard for a heart ailment, said Monday night in an interview with The Washington Post that "I knew nothing about" her interview with a correspondent for Time magazine.

Radetsky, who has turned away all requests for press interviews with Mrs. Beard, noted that she suffered a mild attack of angina pectoris last Friday, the day after the interview with Time.

That was two days before a special subcommittee of the Senate Judiciary Committee began questioning the 53-yearold lobbyist for International and Telegraph Telephone Corp. in her hospital bed here. Mrs. Beard's testimony ended abruptly Sunday afternoon, when she had a severe attack of angina, or chest pains, in the presence of six U.S. senators.

Radetsky explained that Mrs. Beard's attacks seemed to be "a build-up of all events ... Nobody knows exactly why these things happen."

He said that because he wanted to avoid any undue stress on Mrs. Beard, he would not consider it safe for her to be interviewed on any subject until after she is released from the hospital next week.

"In light of Sunday's events," Radetsky added, "interviews would be difficult and possibly dangerous while she is in the hospital."

Previously, Mrs. Beard's doctors and lawyers had said that no interviews could be granted until after she had testified before the Senate subcommittee.

" But one of the lobbyist's lawyers, David W. Fleming, said today in a telephone interview from his office in Van Nuys, Calif., that he had arranged the interview with Time after the magazine "had approached me several times."
