Dear Mr. Weisberg,

I was very sorry to hear of your recent illness and hospitalization. Being so close to the date of your speech here at Stevens Point, I was very disappointed at missing the opportunity of meeting you. However, Dr. Wrona and I both felt very fortunate to have gotten such an able replacement as Mr. Tesar.

The reaction on campus to our program was excellent and I believe about 2000 persons attended Mr. Tesar's speech. Personally, I enjoyed chatting with him and benefitted greatly from this experience.

I've gotten the reaction of many students to the speech. Most agreed that it was absolutely necessary that we should go about getting a re-opening of the investigation by first examining the failures of government agencies involved rather than the men who pulled the trigger. Of course

there were those who expected Teser to show films & slides, discuss theories and tell them "who did it". I think that attitude is unfortunate, especially when you consider the immensely important, and basic facts they seem to ignore.

I think I realize much more now what you and Jim Teser are trying to do and I realize it is the best and only way this thing can be done right - once and for all!
