After many phone conversations and letters John Barbour was here a couple of months ago for a lengthy interview. He is a former Emmied NBC-TV Washington producer now in California. He just raved about what I've done and its importance. While he had no script to show me he assured me that what he did would have no relationship with any conspiracy theorizing. Michaels wants "WWII" to be made "sooner than later." And that means this summer. But they're still talking. And will continue the talks next week in N.Y. Michaels also plans a Cone Head movie by/with Dan Aykroyd at Par. "I live to serve Paramount," Michaels laughed. He also lives to serve "Saturday Night Live"—which received its highest rating average, 9.4/27, last month. Said Michaels, "I'll stay with 'SNL' as long as there's an NBC." Hmm ... March 14, Garth Brooks and John Goodman host "SNL." Another "SNL" alumnus, Jon Lovitz, stars in a new form "live" show for Fox, launching in May from Brillstein-Grey in association with Castle Rock. Alan Zweibel scripts-produces ... Also at Fox TV, Dave Thomas is writing, will produce "Everything but the Show"—it's about writers of a TV show. This could be very funny. On second thought, this better be very funny ... With the enormous success of the feature version of "Wayne's World," offers have increased for a bigscreen "Beverly Hills, 90210." But Aaron Spelling tells us it won't happen. "I won't prostitute the show for a quick buck. I won't take them (the kids) out of the context of their times. ## FOX TO AFFILIS: OPT FOR CO-OP

**NEW YORK**—Fox Broadcasting Co. is encouraging its affiliates to take advantage of co-op advertising funds to bring the level of their May sweeps viewing up, seeking to boost projections for an additional night of programming expected to bow in the summer.

Fox pointed out to stations that any sales forecasts for the new night would be based on the performance during the sweeps period.

Throughout the May sweeps, Thursday, Friday and Sunday night programming is eligible for extra radio and print co-op dollars.

Fox is also making the dollars available for "Fox Night at the Movies" through March and April. Under the co-op plans, Fox credits or pays rebates to affiliates who place local ads for the weblet's programs.

With plans for the added night, it's expected Fox will pull out all the stops when scheduling the May sweeps. Indeed, the weblet is coming off what is likely to be its best February sweeps performance in its history (see ratings story, page 1).

Recent speculation has Fox adding Wednesday nights to its lineup, anchored by the "Beverly Hills, 90210" spinoff "Melrose Place," although a company spokeswoman said no decisions have been made.

Another night will be introduced six to 18 months later, depending on the economy.

## Fox O&amp;O group exits INTV in move to tighten budget

The seven-station Fox O&O group has pulled out of the Assn. of Independent Television Stations, a move that will save the group about \$200,000 a year.

Fox Television Stations prez Greg Nathanson blamed competitive and economic factors for the decision to withdraw yesterday.

"We have been exploring for a couple of years whether we want to be members of INTV or not," he said.

Nathanson maintained that Fox has "nothing against" INTV, which has strongly opposed departing Fox chairman Barry Diller's efforts to repeal cable's compulsory copyright license.

The cancellation of Fox's INTV membership is unrelated to any issue or Diller's resignation, ac-
