ANNIVERSARY OF THE ELEC-TION OF JEANNETTE RANKIN, FIRST WOMAN ELECTED TO CONGRESS

More than a quarter of a century later Montanans again elected this courageous woman, Jeannette Rankin, to Congress, and it fell to her on December 8, 1941, to cast the lone vote against World War II. Jeannette Rankin said at that time, "As a woman, I can't go to war, and therefore I refuse to vote to send anyone like". else."

Today, three-quarters of a century after her election, we recognize Jean-nette Rankin and her courage.
