MEMPHIS, Feb. 14 (AP)—A Federal judge has ruled that James Earl Ray's brother, Jerry, should not be granted damages for libel in a book on the aisassination of the late Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Ir.

pany.

Jerry Ray sued Mr. McMillan and the publishing concern, contending that the book libels him and violates his constitutional rights.

Judge Brown ruled, however, that Jerry
Ray had executed a document saying,
"In return for the payment of \$500 for
information about the assassination of
Dr. Martin Luther King, I, Jerry Ray, release George McMillan and his publisher,
Little, Brown & Company from all claims
forever for libel and slander, invasion of
privacy or for any reasons at all."
