She was refusing to cooperate with us, even to re extent of hiring a lawyer."

What a world of police misunderstanding is

revealed in this simple observation! The notion that a defendant is uncooperative if she seeks the assistance of counsel while undergoing police interrogation probably pervades every police station in America. Yet such assistance is her absolute constitutional right; and the Constitution sets her wholly free from any obligation to cooperate in her own conviction. Here is a striking illustration of the reasons why police interrogation of suspects ought always to be rigorously circumscribed by the law and jealously supervised by the courts.
