Sheppard Sees Retrial as Boon

CLEVELAND, June 10-Declairing that a "heinous crime" must be punished, the state of Ohio today ordered a new trial for convicted wife-slayer Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard.

Shepard, who served more than nine years in prison for the slaying of his first wife, said he was "all for" a new trial and "eager to attain complete vindication.

Cuyahoga County Prosecutor John T. Corrigan gave his decision on a new trial today after studying the U.S. Supreme Court ruling Monday which said Sheppard did not receive a fair trial in 1954. Corrigan told newsmen he decided on a new trial because he thought that "society has been the victim of a heinous crime, and it demands redress.
