Enclosed is the proposed affidavit. With the very strong material you have provided, I decided to limit it to just what is undeniably relevant to the present case. I may work some of the other material in your draft of the affidavit into a motion to strike Rhoads' affidavit or a motion to compel answers to certain interrogatories, or the opposition to the defendant's summary judgment motion. I intend to educate Gesell little by little rather than attempt it at one fell swoop.

I think your affidavit and the attachments to it may by themselves be enough to win the case. In fact, I expect that they will be. If they aren't, I'll add more.

I think the most important task is to get the exemption 1 objection out of the way, then, if necessary, concentrate on the others later. That explains the principal focus of both your affidavit and the second set of interrogatories.

I have erred on the date the spectro brief by the government is due. My book on Supreme Court Practice is not recent enough--in late 1971 the rules were changed to give the government an extra 20 days to respond to a petition for <u>cert</u>. This gives the government a total of 50 days and means that their brief isn't due until March 14.
