Dear Mr. Liebeler:

In the past, you have not responded when I have written you. Nonetheless, in fairness to you, I write again.

My work, as you may presume, has continued. I regard it as fruitful, particularly in areas that relate to your function on the Warren Commission. It seems possible to me that you misread or misunderstand my motive and my purposes. I think it would be useful were we to have a meeting where we might have a reasonably frank discussion.

If you consider this for a moment, you will realize that I certainly do not expect you to make any great revelations to me, that what I really intend is letting you know certain things - unless there are things you would like to tell me.

We need have no "seconds" unless you prefer, but I do think it would be better and we both would feel more comfortable if we each made a tape recording. As you will be telling me nothing that would embarrass you, I think you need have no apprehensions about this.

It is not my intention to seem or to be presumptuous. I have no way of knowing what you think of my judgment; but for what it is worth, I suggest that your own reputation and future may be very much at stake. My desire is the truth, as total and impartial as man can make it, without any one man having to bear the burden not properly his.

I expect to be in the Los Angeles area toward the end of the month. I will be making a number of public appearances. If you would like to be informed of my schedule, I will advise you when I know it.
