SYNOPSIS

Extensive investigation conducted thus far has failed to establish that the "FAIR PLAY FOR CUBA COMMITTEE" had offices at 514 Camp Street, New Orleans. It has likewise been impossible to find anyone who recalls ever seeing Lee Harvey Oswald at this address.

DETAILS OF INVESTIGATION

Reference is made to report dated 12-3-63, submitted by SA A. G. Vial and covering investigation conducted during the period November 22, 1963, through December 2, 1963, by SA's A. G. Vial, Anthony E. Gerrets, and Roger D. Counts, as well as SAIC John W. Rice.

On Pages 14 and 15 of the above-mentioned report, comment was made on the address "514 Camp Street, New Orleans, La.", which appeared on some of the literature in the possession of Lee Harvey Oswald when he was arrested by members of the New Orleans Police Department on 8-26-63 for loitering with several Cubans. Mention of the address "514 Camp Street" is also made on page 2 of my report of 12-4-63, covering investigation conducted by SAIC John W. Rice and myself during the period November 21-27, 1963.

On 12-1-63, reporting agent interviewed Mr. Arnesto M. Rodriguez, Sr., 1205 St. Charles Avenue, New Orleans - Telephone: 523-3720.

Mr. Rodriguez, Sr., is 72 years of age, having been born in Havana, Cuba on 3-15-91. Mr. Rodriguez stated that he attended the Chenet Institute (no longer existent) at New Orleans, completing a high school course and specializing in English. This was about 1907. He said he subsequently attended the Soule Business College, New Orleans, graduating therefrom in September, 1909, having completed a 2-year commercial course. He said he returned to Cuba and subsequently established himself in the wholesale electrical business. He said he continued in the electrical business in Havana until

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November, 1960, when Castro confiscated all of his assets, including his home in Havana, his country estate outside of Havana, and all of his other properties, bank account, etc.

Mr. Rodriguez, Sr., stated that Sergio Aracena Smith, mentioned on Page 15 of Shival's report of 12-1-63, was formerly a New Orleans delegate to the Cuban Revolutionary Council, with offices at 51st Camp Street, Room #6, second floor, New Orleans, La. He said that Aracena was fired from his position as New Orleans delegate to the C.R.C. by the organization's main office in Miami, because practically all Cubans in New Orleans were afraid Aracena and his activities - not because he was cooperating with Castro but because of his dangerousness. According to Mr. Rodriguez, Aracena was disapproving of the organization's forces. Mr. Rodriguez was of the opinion that Aracena may possibly be now in Miami but not as all certain as to this.

Mr. Rodriguez, Sr., stated that Carlos Orlando, mentioned on Pages 16 and 20 of Shival's report of 12-1-63 knew Aracena well and was held on frequently "very close connection" with Aracena after the latter was fired.

Mr. Rodriguez stated that Aracena made frequent visits to the office of Henry Caire, then located at 705 Camp Street, New Orleans. He said Henry Caire was the principal organizer of the organization known as C.R.C. with headquarters at 51st Camp Street. He said that Henry Caire had prevailed upon Aracena to join or become a part of the "COMITÉ TO KICK CUBA OUT OF CUBA" and that Aracena was connected with the "GRUPOS" even after he was fired as New Orleans delegate to the "CUBA REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL," according to the opinion of Mr. Rodriguez, Sr.

According to Mr. Rodriguez, Sr., Carlos Quiroga was not an actual member of either the "COMITÉ TO KICK CUBA OUT OF CUBA" but participated in meetings with the members of the "GRUPOS" for the purpose of presenting unity among or between the several local anti-Castro organizations such as the "CUBAN REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" and the "MÍNISTROS' REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL."

Mr. Rodriguez, Sr., stated that the "COMITÉ TO KICK CUBA OUT OF CUBA" was founded primarily to raise funds with which to buy arms and supplies for use by the "GRUPOS" and that the "GRUPOS" has no actual revolutionary activities of any kind against Castro. He said that the "GRUPOS" was, however, definitely opposed to Castro and would offer cooperation in the overthrow of Castro.

Mr. Rodriguez, Sr., stated that Romy Caire had a quantity of pamphlets or circulars printed, which he had distributed by hand, soliciting funds for the "CUBA REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL." According to Mr. Rodriguez, Romy Caire advised that contributions were to be sent either to 51st Camp Street or to the Post Office box of Sergio Aracena. Mr. Rodriguez, Sr., said that he had never seen Oswald in his life and only knew that Oswald had had a fight with George Bergman and two other Cubans on Canal Street, New Orleans, for which he had been arrested on 8-26-63. He said that he had no idea why

the "COMITÉ TO KICK CUBA OUT OF CUBA" was using the address of 51st Camp Street, New Orleans, former address of the "MÍNISTROS' REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL," an anti-Castro organization, whereas the "P.C.C." was pro-Castro. Mr. Rodriguez said he did not know of anyone who had belonged to the P.C.C.

Mr. Rodriguez stated that recent newspaper articles had indicated that Oswald's former landlady at New Orleans had stated that Oswald's wife often attended meetings at "Young Orleans," yet she could only speak Russian, giving rise to the suspicion that "Young Orleans" must have been other Russians attending such meetings. He substantiated this interview with Mr. Rodriguez, Sr., reporting agents once attended meetings at New Orleans, explaining that, as far as she knew, Oswald's wife very seldom left their apartment and when she did leave the apartment it was mostly to go to a neighborhood grocery to buy bread, milk and items of that nature. She said she did not know of anyone who would have looked after their child while she would have been attending such meetings. It is her definite belief that while she would have been attending such meetings, it was not on a frequent basis.)

On 12-1-63 interviewed Mr. Joseph Gill, 912 St. Claude Street, New Orleans - telephone 912-7411, mentioned on Page 15 of Shival's report of 12-1-63. Mr. Gill stated that he did not know Oswald personally and had never seen him. He said he had seen photos of Oswald on television and in newspapers since President Kennedy's assassination.

Mr. Gill stated that he has been a member of the "CUBA REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" for about the past two years. He said that this organization formerly had offices at 51st Camp Street, 2nd floor, for about six months during 1962-63, that Sergio Aracena Smith had been the New Orleans delegate to the C.R.C. He said that Luis Ovalle, Aracena, Sr., Alberto M. Rodriguez, Jr., Sergio Aracena Smith, and himself were authorized to sign checks in behalf of the C.R.C., as was Carlos J. Granaderos, CPA.

Mr. Gill stated that Carlos Santos, publisher of the books entitled "The Cuban Against Cuba" is a notorious Communist or so he has heard. He also stated that the "CUBA PLAN FOR CUBA COUNTERATTACK" is a well-known Communist front and is directed from Havana.

Mr. Gill stated that he is presently employed as Production Manager by "THE INDEPENDENCE COUNCIL OR THE MÍNISTROS," claiming that he makes tape recordings of Indian-American recorded folk recordings from Communist countries, which recordings are broadcast in Latin American countries. He indicated that some of these recordings are also used in some Louisiana schools. "THE INDEPENDENCE COUNCIL OR THE MÍNISTROS INC." has offices at 620 Gravier Street, New Orleans - telephone 524-2101.

On 12-2-63 interviewed Mr. Luis Ovalle, 1625 Harlan Street, New Orleans - telephone 282-7781 (next door). This is actually the telephone number of Charles L. Camp, Jr., Ovalle's son-in-law.

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"Mr. Ravel stated that he was originally connected with the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL," when Gen. G. J. New Orleans, and has been the new Orleans delegate to that organization, when Gen. G. J. New Orleans was "elected" from that position. Mr. Ravel said he had never seen Gen. G. J. New Orleans personally and could furnish no information about him. Mr. Ravel was shown a copy of the booklet entitled "The Cuban Rebels' Cuba" but could furnish no information as to why the rubber stamp impression "P.C.C. Sull Camp Co." was put onto this booklet.

Mr. Ravel stated that the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" had left behind quite a few propaganda leaflets or pamphlets at Sull Camp Street when they moved from that address, at which time the headquarters for this organization were moved to his home at 4651 Harvey St., New Orleans.

Mr. Ravel stated that Billy Montelione, of the Montelone Hotel, New Orleans, had been chairman and sponsor of the "WILSON TO FREE CUBA COMMITTEE."

Mr. Ravel stated that Sergio Arevalo Smith had a poor reputation for honesty because as a liaison officer was concerned that Arevalo was suspected of having embezzled some of the funds of the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL," he said that Arevalo had allegedly gone to "Lat" about a year or so ago after he had been fired as delegate at New Orleans by the "W.R.C."

On 12-2-63 reporting agent received a telephone call from Mr. Armando Rodriguez, Sr. He pointed out that the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" had moved from Sull Camp Street, New Orleans, better than 10 years ago, whereas it appeared that the activities of the W.R.C. for Cuban delegates here apparently occurred during July and August, 1963.

On 12-2-63 reporting Agent received a telephone call from Mr. Luis Ravel. He stated that he had looked up some records and determined that he took over as delegate for the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL," New Orleans, in February, 1962, and a short time thereafter noted that organization's office from Sull Camp Street to his home. He said that the "WILSON TO FREE CUBA COMMITTEE" was organized shortly thereafter and lasted only about a month or so. Mr. Ravel stated that the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" is still in existence, the present delegates being Mr. Frank Mairis, 1603 Baron Smith Ave., New Orleans, La., Telephone 635-3662, who maintains the organization's office as his home. Mr. Ravel also stated that Gen. G. J. New Orleans had also been a member of the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" but is now a delegate for the "WILSON TO FREE CUBA COMMITTEE" at New Orleans.

During interviews with Luis Ravel he informed me that he had left New Orleans about a year or so ago and gone to Venezuela to take part in the anti-Castro movements in that country that he attributed his strength by working too hard in such activities and enlivened what could be classed as a nervous break-down. He is said to be presently under the care of a psychiatrist and to have divorced himself from any anti-Castro activities whatever because of his health.

On 12-2-63 called at the office of the Hotel, Motels, and Restaurant Employees' Union, Local 8165, located at Sull Camp St., New Orleans, where I interviewed Mr. Robert Davis Dugay, Secretary-Treasurer, and Mrs. Helen McCarthy, Office Secretary, with regard to the results. They stated that they had never seen Lee Harvey Oswald and have nothing of the

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"MAIN PLATE FOR CUBA COMMITTEE" ever being at this address.

On 12-2-63 called at the offices of Amalgamated Association of Street Electricians Building & Color Glass Employees of America, A.I.M.C.O., Division 1710, with offices on the second floor at Sull Camp St., New Orleans, interviewing Mr. George S. Gray, President. Mr. Gray stated that he has been in New Orleans for about three years; that he does not recall ever seeing Lee Harvey Oswald in the Johnson Building located at Sull Camp Street or elsewhere in New Orleans; further, that he had never heard of the "MAIN PLATE FOR CUBA COMMITTEE."

At approximately 2100 P. M. on 12-2-63 reporting agent telephoned Harry Galvin, Proprietor, of the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" at New Orleans. He said that he has been a customer to Harry Galvin's since 1961. He knew nothing of Lee Harvey Oswald ever having any connections with the address at Sull Camp Street, New Orleans.

On 12-2-63 reporting Agent interviewed Mr. William A. Montelione, President, Montelone Hotel, New Orleans. He stated that he had been persuaded by a number of his friends to join the "WILSON TO FREE CUBA COMMITTEE" and that he was chosen as general chairman of the organization. Mr. Montelione stated that the "WILSON TO FREE CUBA COMMITTEE" was organized to raise funds in support of the "Wilson Revolutionary Council"; that it was soon realized that all of the funds raised by the "WILSON TO FREE CUBA COMMITTEE" were being used to defray expenses incurred by the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" such as newspaper, television and radio publicity, etc., etc. It is stated that inherent in the "WILSON TO FREE CUBA COMMITTEE" was faded and the organization "folded up." Mr. Montelione could furnish no information re Lee Harvey Oswald.

On the afternoon of 12-2-63 contacted Mr. Sam Newman, 1131 Natchez St., New Orleans, owner of the Newman Building located at Sull Camp St., New Orleans, and had him come to the office for interview. During the interview Mr. Newman stated that the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" had occupied office space in Room 66 of the Newman Building from October, 1961, through February, 1962, that the office occupied by them rented for \$50.00 per month that the W.R.C. failed to pay their rent monthly and owed him about \$250.00 in back rent when they moved. He stated that on 1-2-63, Carlos J. Orsader, Certified Public Accountant, Publison Alde, New Orleans, who acted as Accountant for the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" on a voluntary basis, gave him a check for \$400.00 for part payment of the rent and that he received no further payments from Mr. Newman. Mr. Newman stated that Sergio Arevalo Smith and Carlos Quiroga were associated with the "W.R.C."

Mr. Newman stated that the "WILSON REVOLUTIONARY COUNCIL" left a lot of literature in his office when they moved from the Newman Building that when they failed to return for it he had it disposed of by turning it over to the Salvation Army or some such organization. Mr. Newman was shown a photograph of Lee Harvey Oswald but stated that he could not recall ever seeing Oswald anywhere.

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"Mr. Swanson stated that when the WORLD REVIVALIST COUNCIL vacated the RENAISSANCE BUILDING, he failed to surrender the keys to their offices, adding that they had no separate sets of keys to the office. He said that about ten days or two weeks after the CUBAIS had moved, he had occasion to visit the RENAISSANCE BUILDING one day and on that occasion he saw a young white man unlocking the door to the office formerly occupied by the WORLD REVIVALIST COUNCIL. He said he asked this fellow what he was doing and he remarked that he was taking over the office, whereupon Mr. Swanson told him that the office had been closed and that the WORLD REVIVALIST COUNCIL no longer had office space in the RENAISSANCE BUILDING and that he would have to leave. He said there were no indications that the CUBAIS had used the offices previously. Mr. Swanson described this individual as a white male, 24-26 years old, 5'9", 155 lbs., fair complexion, light brown or blonde hair; spoke with a Spanish accent.

During the interview with Mr. Remy Calire, he stated that Dario Aratchay may be wanted on a larceny charge; that Aratchay allegedly drove a car from New Orleans to Miami.

On 12-5-43 reporting agent interviewed Mr. Robert E. Denrell, Director of Finance, City of New Orleans also Mr. Joseph L. Culkin, Secretary to the Director of Finance, to determine whether the WAIS PLAT 196 CUBA COOPERATIVE had applied for a permit from the City of New Orleans to operate in New Orleans. It was found that this organization was not on record with the Director of Finance.

On 12-6-43 SAC Fico interviewed VIN Special Agent Paul Aikens, New Orleans, as to the results of any investigation which they may have conducted in an attempt to connect Lee Harvey Oswald and the WAIS PLAT 196 CUBA COOPERATIVE with the address Slim Camp Street, New Orleans. SA Aikens advised that they had checked this angle out thoroughly.

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New Orleans and in the event any information is developed which would place him at Sullo Camp St., New Orleans, it will be the subject of another report.

had recommended them to him prospective clients. He said that Martin had also brought them to see Victor Charles Newcomer, and had helped him to get a charter or permit to operate in New Orleans. He said that on one occasion Guillen appeared to have a short wave radio transmitter which he was trying to repair.

Mr. Neuman stated that he has not rented any offices to new tenants in the Irenan Building, 510 Camp Street, since about September, 1942. He could furnish no information as to why the rubber stamp impression "P G Still Camp St., N.Y. OULANS, LA" appeared in the booklet "The Cities Against Cuba" which had been recovered from Oswald when he was arrested at New Orleans on August 26.

Mr. Neuman stated that someone informed him about three months ago and wanted to rent offices for him, requesting and wanted an appointment to meet him. He also stated that about nothing transpired as a result of this telephone call. He also stated that about four or five months ago another fellow (white male) about 37/38 years old, medium build, light olive complexion; dark eyes; dark brown hair) came to see him about renting an office which he wanted to use for night classes in Spanish. He said this fellow rented for \$120 per month and the subject paid him \$10,000 rental and came back the same weekend to see him. He said this fellow later told him he had not recruited sufficient students and that he no longer wanted the space. He told Mr. Neuman to keep the \$10,000 which he had paid him as rental.

During the late afternoon of 12-2-69, recording agent interviewed in, Rudy Caire, 616 Danline St., New Orleans, where he resides and where he also operates an advertising agency. Mr. Caire stated that he agreed to recall Oswald applying for a job with his company, while he had offices at 706 Carroll Bluff, corner Camp and Canal Sts., New Orleans. He said this was several months ago and about the time Oswald had a radio debate over Radio Station WDSU, New Orleans, in August, 1967. He said this was the only time

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
