COPPOLA SUES FOR \$5 MILLION

Claims Libel, Slander in Life Magazine Article

State Police Capt. Roland F. Coppola filed a \$5 million suit for libel and slander Tuesday in federal district court against Time, Inc., in connection with an article which appeared in Life Magazine Sept. 29, 1967.

It is alleged in the suit that the article, entitled "Brazen Empire of Crime," purported to publish an expose of "extensive criminal and nefarious activi-ties of the criminal society known as the Cosa Nostra in and about Lafayette, Louisiana."

Coppola claims that he is a career police officer, having served since November, 1952, with an unblemished record and has risen to the rank of captain in command of Troop I in Lafayette.
