The governor said in an interview at the Roosevelt Hotel that Sheridan, former member of the Justice Department, was partially responsible for Hoffa's conviction.

The Justice Department was concerned about the investigation of Partin, McKeithen said, and was afraid it might lead to Hoffa's release from prison.

He said the state had no connections whatsoever in any effort to free Hoffa from prison. However, the state is not going to allow Partin "open season" just because he helped to convict Hoffa, the governor
