Partin Ordered To Pay \$15,000 To Ex-Member

WASHINGTON (AP) — The 3 y in National Labor Relations Board has ordered Edward G. Partin, a Baton Rouge Teamsters Union leader, to pay more than \$15,000 to a black-listed former union membed.

ns The NLRB said Partin, still Judger indictment charging emberzelement of union money, so blacklisted union member Cally vin G. Clary and got him fired for raising questions about Partin's handling of union funds.

CLARY HAS been trying to solution to collect from Partin, whose testimoney helped imprison Teamsters President James R. Hoffa, since the board first ruled against Partin four years ago.

Clary was part of a faction in 50 a Baton Rouge Teamsters local which tried to oust Partin as business agent on grounds of mishandling of funds and mistreating union members.

The NLRB in its summary judgment order yesterday, said the partin had ignored previous orders to pay Clary, including the partin to the partin to be a U.S. Court of Appeals decision upholding the back-pay order.

The board ordered Partin to pay Clary \$13,555 plus interest of for loss of pay, \$403 interest for medical expenses Clary would have been entitled to as a union member, and \$1,125 in payments in

the EMBEZZLEMENT charges have been pending against Partin since 1962, two syears before he showed up as star federal witness in Hoffa's I. 1964 jury tampering trial.

n Hoffa was convicted and is serving an eight-year sentence at the Lewisburg, Pa., federal penitentiary.

A federal judge in Baton Rouge earlier this month refused to dismiss the embezzlement charges against Partin 2
and accused the Justice Department of making a deal to
pay off Partin for his testimony
against Hoffa.

Sen. Robert F. Kennedy, D-N.Y., was attorney general at the time of Hoffa's trial.

"ARE THE interests of justice to be served by granting of life-time immunity to someone because of the wishes of a previous attorney geseral?" asked U.S. Dist. Judge E. Gordon West at the Baton Rouge hearing, Friday, May 3.

Justice Department attorney
Michael Epstein denied at the
hearing that Partin had been
given immunity, but asked that
the embezzlement charges be
dismissed "in the interests of
justice" because Partin helped
in the Hoffa trial.

"If that isn't a payoff, I don't know what it is," West said in refusing to dismiss the 26-count indictment accusing Partin of embezzlement and falsifying union records.
