SUBJECT: JFK DR. LIVINGSTON

To all, I attended the Kennedy Assassination Symposium in Dallas Texas in November. I now have the video tapes of the panel discussions and will be able to quote accurately. In my opinion the speaker with the most interesting and important information was Robert B. Livingston M.D.

During WW2 Dr. Livingston was in charge of a Hospital in Okinawa. He cared for hundreds of persons with gunshot wounds. At the time of the JFK Assassination Dr. Livingston was, "Scientific Director for two of the National Institutes of Health, The National Institute for Mental Health, and The National Institute for Neurological Diseases and Blindness, In Bethesda, in the Public Health Service."

Upon hearing about the Assassination of JFK he contacted Medical personel at Parkland Hospital and was informed of a wound in Kennedy's neck and crebellum extruded from the back of Kennedy's head. Before the casket reached Bethesda Hospital he contacted Dr. Humes by telephone and made him aware of the neck wound and cerbellum being extruded from the rear of Kennedy's head. He impressed upon Dr. Humes the importance of dissecting the neck wound to find the path of the bullet. The conversation was interrupted by the FBI and he was informed that the conversation could not continue.

At the end of Dr. Livingston's presentation he made these profound statements. I will try to quote accurately.

"Dr. Humes testimony to the warren Commission that he only learned about the neck wound on the day after when he talked with Dr. Perry at Parkland Hospital by telephone, means that the autopsy and Dr. Humes were already under this Non-medical control before the staart of the autopsy"

"The Photographs and drawings of the brain in the National Archives are those of some other brain than John Fitzgerald Kennedy"

His final conclusion was. "There had to be more than one gunman."

Did anyone else on this board see the Dr. Livingston presentation? He seemed credible to me.
