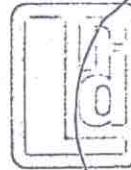
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6 In reference to our continuing investigation into

SUBJECT: Dunn & Bradstreet Rating

Since Dunn & Bradstreet have noted a change in rating and now show us as A+ (financial strength over \$750,000) and "1 = composite credit appraisal 'good'," I think this is all we could expect at this time.

I suggest the following letter be written by Jim LeBlanche to the proper person at D & B, although there may be some reason why Jim would feel the letter is unnecessary, and if so, then I would go along with Jim on his thinking.

The letter reads as follows:

"Now that the job is behind us, I wanted to express our appreciation for your cooperation in straightening out our rating with Dunn & Bradstreet. May I say that Roy Loftin, who felt that our rating should be AAA-1 is satisfied that this interim rating is proper in view of the previous problems we had when small accounts wrote in and clouded our credit standing.

I believe that the procedures we have worked out will accomplish the desired result -- that of giving you accurate and responsible information on which to base your rating.
