Jim, I did not see in the Post what I heard on the radio 5 a/m. in one version and 2:50 p.m. in an expansion: the claim by Sem. Long's former secretary that he had been poisoned through candy given him by a Clayton, Mos man in the first story and that Mrs. Long had filed a \$3,500,000 alienation suit against the former secretary. Naturally, no autopsy and the coroner not even a physician. Now I don't know if there is anything to this. But you should remember that Ferry Foreman at about the right time went to Clayton, NOT to court, to see a client. When saide from travel costs he charges \$200 an hour, it has to be a wealthy client with a serious problem. At this point you phoned. One of the possibilities is what had in mine.
