

LOUISIANA'S likeable Sen. Russell Long, who approaches people with all the appeal of a puppy dog with tail wagging, has started to slip into political oblivion on the heels of the man he tried to save—Tom Dodd.

He will have a hard time getting re-elected in Louisiana if Gov. John McKeithen runs against him. And several Senators, angry over Long's antics, are talking about deposing him not only as Democratic Whip but as Senate Finance Committee chairman. They have urged Sen. George Smathers (D-Fla.), who has announced his intention not to run for reelection, to remain in the Senate and take over the chairmanship.

Committee members have offered to lead a rebellion against Long if Smathers will remain.
