Dear Mr. Weisberg,

Please excuse the penmanship. There are times when the typewriter appals me.

Well, this is a sad time isn't it? Now we've lost our candidate. Where do we go from here? Are you still writing - and are you still living up to your faith in Jim Garrison? That is where you lost me. Garrison has been nothing but a "front" to appease the people and to mislead them - a sort of a placebo, so to speak.

And now back to me and my story. Mr. Weisberg, you can write as many books as you please and the FBI could care less. But let Mrs. McManara write one letter and they quickly block it. In March of this year I wrote to Senator Kennedy enclosing a photostatic copy of something in Life Magazine. My eye caught it

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right away and I knew there had been some distortion. Very few people would detect it. In fact, I am probably the only one who would. Why? Because the name "Linnis" means something to me. See how perfectly it fits in - then compare with the rest of the letter. It compares with "Frances" only. That, too, was added. He was 8 yrs. old when he wrote that letter. Confirmation is administered after the 12th yr. At least, it's that way here. Senator Kennedy never answered or acknowledged that letter.

So when he came to California, I contacted Mr. Arvizu at Kennedy Hdqtrs. and went to work as a volunteer for Kennedy. Mrs. Arvizu telephoned me one day that Senator ^{K.} Ribas was making a visit there and that he (Arvizu) wanted all his workers to meet the Senator. His visit here was cancelled - Remember, my telephone is "bugged". They gave a flimsy excuse about the debate, etc. It's strange that McCarthy's trip wasn't cancelled.

Last Tuesday, June 11, I went out

of town and posted a letter to the President, sending a copy to Senator Kuchel. Both registered, airmailed. Then I watched the news. Mr. Johnson was whisked away to the W. N. for surprise visit. I heard Pauline Frederick - it was a real surprise. Then the next day he went to Texas. I was in my car when I heard this so I said to my son, "I'll meet him there with a telegram." This I did. Mr. Arvizu advised me to send a copy to Senator Edward Kennedy - and this morning I did just that. (My letters are becoming too expensive.)

This is about all now. After reading your letter again, I realize that I should have concentrated on what happened concerning that lawsuit in 1960. It was a mock hearing to mislead me. There is fraud and forgery - ah, it's a long story - all of those attorneys could be disbarred - there were only 12 of them.

I should like to hear from you. (Your books are not on the stands any more)
