

When his questions finally got to the assassination, Specter lead Mrs. Kennedy. It is true that she was not looking at the President at the time of the first shot, but this is not the way to get her best recollection. Also, if it was "seconds" before she turned, on that basis alone the report is very wrong. How could she possibly give an honest, meaningful answer to Q2, "how long between the shot and the President's reaction when the pictures show reaction by him before she looked? These question omit the single, most important thing: her observation of the wounds and the wounding. She was looking at the President when the fatal bullet hit. But in asking that question, the Commission ran the risk of getting testimony indicative of a front-entrance wound, for he moved only backward before falling to his left, on her. Most of these questions are without significance in an assassination investigation, viz: "Did you have any difficulty in returning to the rear seat from the back end of the car?"; "What was your position immediately after...?" "...Did you come into contact with President Kennedy?" Then, what position was Hill in, as though the abundant photo record didn't show.
