The price varied-anywhere from $\$ 5.99$ to $\$ 10$ - but the sales were brisk as William Manchester's 'The Death of a President" went on sale in many stores here over the weekend.
Most stores in the area received their shipments of the controversial and much-publicized book last Friday or Saturday and started selling it immediately although the official publication date is not until this Friday.

At the other end of the price scale are Peoples Drug Stores (\$5.99) and Drug Fair stores (around $\$ 6$ or a little more). For Peoples, it was a first venture into sale of a more expensive hardback book. Most of their book sales are in paperbacks, a spokes man said.
In between are discount stores, such as the Discount Book Shop, 1342 Cornecticut ave. nw. ( $\$ 8$, representing the store's regular 20 per cent dis-
ing factor in its retail price, merchandising spokesmen said yesterday. It varies according to the quantity ordered and the outlet from which the books are purchased.
Several merchandisers said the drug stores apparently are satisfied to sell the book with little if any profit, using it as a "loss leader" to bring customers into the stores to purchase other items.
