The picture graphically con-tradicts William Manchester's account of the oath-taking as contained in this week's Look magazine serialization of his book, "The Death of a President."

Manchester reproted that no male Kennedy aide attended the swearing in of President Johnson at the hastily arranged ceremany aboard the presidential plane at Love Field, just outside Dallas.

The point is made by Manchester to emphasize what he decribes as intense acrimony that existed between the Kennedy and Johnson staffs amid the horror of the tragedy.

The author depicts O'Donnell on theplane as "pacing the corridor outside the bedroom like a caged tiger, his hands clapped over his ears as though to block the oath."

When reached today, O'Donnell disputed Manchester's account, which has been buffeted from barious quarters from the start of the serialization.

(In Washington, Malcolm Kilduff, the acting White House news secretary who was aboard Air Force One, corroborated O'Donnell's recollections. "Kenny was all right," he said. "Kenny kept his head.")

"I was standing next to Jackie through the whole ceremoany," declared O'Donnell. "I walked with her from the bedroom, to where the ceremony took palce, ad I sta yed with her the whole time."
