Firm Visions Garage Under JFK Plaza

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 20 (AP) A \$2.8 million underground garage beneath Kennedy Memorial Plaza in downtown Dallas was recommended yesterday by a private firm of consulting engineers. The study suggested a 490-space, fourlevel garage below the block which will contain a memorial to President John F. Kennedy.

The firm, Wilbur Smith and Associates, told County Commissioners income from the parking lot could pay off in 40 years the revenue bonds required for its construction.
