Newsweek quoted a Look executive as saying:

"The kind of material in it doesn't usually find its way into print. This is the best of the Kennedy books. It's extraordinarily strong. The President is going to have to read it and I don't think he's going to like it."

Manchester, a former newspaperman, spent two years compiling material for the book, Newsweek said. He then submitted it to a panel of five ex-New Frontiersmen -but to no member of the Kennedy family-and bluepenciled most portions they objected to on the basis of propriety or violation of national interest.
