Robert Kennedy Is Reported Weighing Accord—Book Publisher Not at Talks

Mrs. John F. Kennedy and Look magazine apparently settled their dispute last night over the serialization of "The Death of a President."

An informed source indicated that the magazine had yielded to virtually all of Mrs. Kennedy's demands that it not publish material she had found to be offensive personally.

There were signs that a final announcement of the settlement was being delayed until it could be cleared with Senator Robert F. Kennedy, who is on vacation in Sun Valley, Idaho, with his family.

Last night, it was learned, the agreement was being discussed with the Senator by telephone.

Earlier in the day, Richard N. Goodwin, an adviser to Mrs. Kennedy, met with William Attwood, the editor in chief of Cowles Communications, Inc., which publishes Look.

Mr. Goodwin had made the final revisions in the 80,000-word, four-part serialization, which Look will now publish in the issue that will be on sale Jan. 10.

In the afternoon, David W. Peck, the attorney who represented Look, met with Simon H. Rifkind, Mrs. Kennedy's attorney, in Mr. Rifkind's office at 575 Madison Avenue.

'A Sensible Package'
While reporters gathered out-

g side, the attorneys discussed, Mr. Rifkind said, "a sensible package" for a settlement. He said that "many other things are involved," not only the text of the serialization.

Mr. Rifkind, a former Federal judge, said earlier that he was not involved in discussions of a settlement. His statement yesterday was his first public actional knowledgment that an agreement was possible.

Mr. Rifkind is with the firm of Paul, Weiss, Rifkind & Garrison.

Mr. Peck, a former presiding justice of the New York Appellate Division, who was sometimes mentioned as a possible Republican candidate for Governor, is with the firm of Sullivan & Cromwell.

During the meeting, television newsman placed six cameras outside Mr. Rifkind's office. Nine microphones were placed on a table.

Harper & Row, which wants to publish "The Death of a President" in book form in April, was not represented at yesterday's meeting. However, it is expected that any agreement with Look would ease the way for a settlement of Mrs. Kennedy's suit against the book publisher.
