Dear Mr. Mankiewicz,

My attention has been drawn to an interview with you broadcast by KBJ radio 12/14/69. In it you said the late Senator Robert Kennedy was satisfied with the official investigation of his brother's assassination because "the people who looked into it for him" were.

After Robert was assassinated, you were quoted as saying he had asked you to look into just this. Having written a book in which I go into this, I am writing to ask you who you referred to in your KBJ interview.

I have further interest because I offered his staff the results of my own investigations on several occasions, going back to 1965. They had no interest, received me coldly, never responded to my letter.

It may interest you to know, if you are not aware of it, that when the Warren Commission sought his endorsement of its Report in advance of publication, he declined it on the ground he knew only what he had been told by it and his then associates.
