Cuban Exile Group Says It Killed 'El Tigre'

A Cuban calle terrorist group called Zero claimed responsibility sesterday for the death of a controversial refugee blown to pieces as he switched on the ignition of his car in Miami last week.

It was the becond exile killing Zero said it had carried out in the past 18 months in the Miami area.

"The secret organization Zero is responsible for the slaying of Rolando Masferrer Rojas on the morning of October 31," said a statement matted to the Miami office of the Associated Press.

Masferrer 44, nicknamed "El Tigre" for its own terrorist exploits in Cube during the Batista dictatorship, had been a Miami exile size the early 1960s

At the time of his death, he was publisher of a weekly anti-Communist newspaper which he used to attack enemies of all political stripes. In Cuba, he had commanded a private army which was said to have killed hundreds of Batista foes in the late 1980s.

Marrerrer was killed because of his "systematic work in the destruction of the anti-Communist struggle," and his tiek to the Cuban G-2 security apparatus, the Zero note said. The G-2 reference was not explained, but the term is used in many countries, including the Politak Mates, to designate the intelligence staff of a division to larger units.

Zero decaired that Maires rer's assessmatten "like that of Joe Elins de la Torriente should

serve as an example for those who disdain the cause of Cuban liberation."

Torriente was killed last year by a gunnan who shot him in the back.
