NEW ORLEANS (AP)-The Central Intelligence Agency is linked to the 1961 burglary of a Louisiana oil field explosives bunker, the New Orleans States-Item quoted a key witness in Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison's Kennedy assassination probe as saying Tuesday.

Garrison has charged three men-Gordon Novel, Sergio Arcacha Smith and Revision the late David W. Ferrie-with conspiring to commit the burglary.

In a story bearing the copyright of the States-Item and the Dayton (Chio) Daily News, the newspaper said Novel, 29, told friends the burglary was a war materials pickup for the CIA.

Novel was quoted as saying the bunker was a staging point for munitions destined for the abortive Bsy of Pigs invasion of Cuba.

Novel, who is wanted in New Orleans as a material witness in the Kennedy probe, is fighting extradition from Columbus, Ohio.

The States-Item said Novel, an electronics expert and former French Cuarter bar operator, has told acquaintances that "he was a CIA operative and will use this role to battle Garrison's charges."

In Columbus, Novel said that the statements that I worked for the CIA are absolutely incorrect. The events as of 1961, the Bay of Pigs invasion, are none of anybody's business, including Mr. Garrison's."

Garrison charged that Novel conspired with Arcacha, a former Cuban exile leader here who now lives in Dallas, and with Ferrie to burglarize a bunker near Houma, La.

Ferrie died five days after news of Garrison's Kennedy death probe became public. The district attorney described him as a central figure in the investigation. Garrison contends a conspiracy to murder President John F. Kennedy was hatched in Ferrie's apartment in September, 1963.
