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Report relative to the unclassified death of Robert Perrin WA, age 41, residing 1713 Calhoun St.

Sgt. Charles Gueldner end Ptn. Sanford Krasnoff, in Patrol Car 22, received a request for an ambulance for 1713 Calhoun St. at about 1:35 A.M., August 28, 1962. Officers were informed by Ptn. John Hamilton of the Central Complaint Bureau that he had roceived a call from Sgt. L. A. Boudreaux of Troop B, State Police, who stated that he had received a phone call from an unknown male who stated to him that "I need help, please send an ambulance righta way. I am at 1713 Calhoun St." Sgt. Boudreaux stated that the phone then fell off.

When Sgt. Charles Gueldner and Ptn. Sanford Krasnoff arrived at the apartment at 1713 Calhoun St. they found the place in darkness. Officers rang the door bell and knocked on the door and the building but were unable to get an answer. The officers checked the area and could hear groans coming from the front side windows of the building. Sgt. Charles Gueldner then want to the rear of the building and found the rear door unlocked. He entered the apartment and found it in darkness but found the victim lying on a bed in the second room of the apartment. Sgt. Charles Gueldner then opened the front door so Ptn. Sanford Krasnoff, Ptn. John Olson and Terry Parta could enters the building. The investigating officers, upon finding the victim, observed that he was lying on the bed in the nude, and was in a semi-conscious condition and had fluids draining from his rectum freely at intervals.

The officers detected a smell of ether in the apartment and they found several empty caus of ether on the floor of the bedroom around the bed on which the victim was lying. Attached to one of the cans was a small type face mask. Also found near the bed on a dresser was a note which appeared to be a suicide note.

Ambulance was ordered and Charity Hospital ambulance arrived on the scene and the victim was conveyed to Charity Hospital.

The property found in the room was confiscated and will be used as evidence in the case.

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Officers made an attempt to get information from neighbors about the victim but were unable to obtain any information at all about the victim. Officers temporarily identified the victim as being Robert Perrin MA, age about 41 years, by papers which were found in the apartment, but no further information could be immiediately obtained as the victim was unable to peak.

Major William McNamara, Field Supervisor, and Sgt. Anthony Polito, PlatoonCommander, were on the scene and supervised the investigation.

On August 28, 1952, someone from Charity Hospital called the Second District Station and informed Ptn. Sanford Krasnoff that the victim had expired and was pronounced dead at 6:05 A.M., August 28, 1962, by Dr. Rielh and that the preliminary diagnosis was acute arsenic poisoning. Officers immediately notified Sgt. C. Drumm of the Homicide Division and he informed the officers that he would handle the investigation of the dead person for his bureau.
