Te said that it was the unlisted 1963 Dallas phone number of Jack Ruby, the man who shot Oswald to death in front of anationwide television audience. The Garrison-discovered code is a simple number reversed system which is masked further by the use of a standard deception number. In most cases, the masking numbers Cawald used 1300' were 4900 and the numbers which Garrison said wors easy for him to remember recause they were associated with his life in New Orleans. Oswald's basic code, as outlined by Perrison, depends on the use of the masking number plus a simple inversion of digits in a near-far, near-far, near rythm. The same rythm, with the pattorn reversed, is used for encoding and decoding. Thus, if you wish to encode the digits 3030

with the Oswald onciphering system, you simply do this: First add a mishing number; let's say 1300.

In Oswald's notebook, it is P.O. 19106. In Shaw's address book, it is P.O. Box 19106. Garrison said the numbers are phony and added:

"When two parties have precisely the same nonexistent or fictional number in their address books, the possibility of coincidence is removed pecause of the uniqueness of a selected non-existent number."

In fact, the DA went on to say, the numbers are enclphered and, when deciphered, produce the 1963 Falles telephone number of Jack Ruby --- the man who gunned down Oswald in the aftermath of Kennedy's murder.

What Garrison said he has found is a simple number reversal system which is maked further by the use of a standard deception much number:

The system produced what "arrison said was Ruby's unlisted telephone at Dallas in 1963, W^Hitehall 1-5601. To arrive at that number, you must begin with P.O. 19106, the numbers found in both the Oswald and Shaw address books.

Decode with the rythm: near (1), far this (6), near (9), far (0), near (1). You now have 16901. Subtract a standard masking number, 1300. The result is the Ruby number, 1-5601. What about the exchange prefix? Carrison said Oswald used the standard telephone dial to encode prefixes, translating letters to numbers, and numbers to letters.

For instance, the letters P.O., on the standard telephone dial, look like this: pm07th P is 7, and λ 0 is 6. The sum of those digits is 13. The only prefix in Dallas witch added up to 13 in 1963 was W^Hitchall --- W (9), ^H (4).

Thus, by decoding you have WH 1-5661.

To check the Garrison thesis, this writer and a colleague applied the same system to the other apparent ciphers in the Oswald address book. And while the system of notation differed slightly, the basic solution formula was the same in
