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A member of the Mayday Collective was jailed yesterday for contempt of court after she refused to answer questions before a federal grand jury investigating the demonstration here in early May.

Marianna R. Fishlowitz, 26, of Fredericksburg, Va., was ordered held in \$5,000 bond by Chief Judge John J. Sirica. Sirica refused, over the protests of Miss Fishlowitz's attorney, to allow her to go free by posting 10 per cent of the bond in cash.

It was the second time in as many days that Miss Fishlowitz had refused to answer the grand jury's questions. On Tuesday she had been asked four questions about her activities and those of the Mayday Collective and a related group, the People's Committee for the Defense of the Black Panther Party.

She refused to answer any of the questions. Her attorney, James H. Foy, said she asserted that the questions were irrelevant and that she was being held in all-American surveillance.

Miss Fishlowitz was brought before Judge Sirica Tuesday, granted immunity to testify and ordered to answer the questions yesterday morning.

Yesterday, however, she continued to refuse to answer the questions and was cited for contempt.

Foy filed a petition last night to have Mrs. Fishlowitz released pending appeal. He expected a decision today.

Foy also argued in federal Court of Appeals ruling applied in Harrisburg, Pa. There, an indictment was dismissed recently because it resulted from an illegal wiretap. Sirica refused. He also refused to release Miss Fishlowitz in her own recognizance or into Foy's custody.

Miss Fishlowitz was the third witness from the Mayday Collective to be jailed for refusing to testify before the grand jury.
