

Oswald called lone killer

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New York (AP)—John J.

McCloy, a member of the Warren Commission, which investigated the 1963 assassination of President Kennedy, said yesterday he is convinced Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone.

"I never saw a case that I thought was more completely proven than . . . the assassination," he said in an hour-long interview with a Columbia Broadcasting System newsman, Eric Sevareid, broadcast by CBS-TV yesterday.

Mr. McCloy, one of seven members of the Warren Commission, described as "just nonsense" various books and articles which contend there was a conspiracy involved in President Kennedy's death and that more than one gunman took part in the killing of the President in Dallas.

Mr. McCloy, 80, said he participated in the Warren Com-

mission's investigation "as a doubting Thomas, but by the time that thing was over, I just felt that was an open-and-shut situation."

When Mr. Sevareid suggested that the late President Johnson always felt there was "some conspiracy" involved in President Kennedy's assassination, Mr. McCloy replied:

"I went down there [to Dallas] convinced, well, not convinced, but thinking there must have been a conspiracy.

"Here the President was shot, and a couple of days later, the fellow that shot him was killed."

He referred to the fatal shooting of Oswald by the late Jack Ruby, a Dallas bar owner.

"It was a strange sort of a thing," Mr. McCloy said. "But when we got down there, I couldn't find any connection."
