If this is faster and more than the minimum required by politeness, it is not something into which you should read too much. And there is no reference to my caution. That I can understand. There is a line between personal opinions and public expressions on the subject I have encountered on the Hill since 1965, with such fearless by rep. as Wayne Morse. No departures. Of the black caucus, not one wrote to thank for the book on the King case, several just wounded not see me or discuss it. The only one who did see me was Conyers, far from the most progressive on such subjects.

But if anything comes of this, I presume you can understand the needless limitations

imposed by JP's refusal to return my foundations file.

Matter of fact, Cunningham is, in a way, close to an exception. He did see me after he was half-way through F-U, and he must have discussed it with his (black) secretary, who was cordial when I dropped back last time I was on the Hial and he wasn't in. She didn t have to see me. The message he wasn't in was enough. And she didn t have to tell me, unsolicitedly, of his personal interest from her discussion of it with him.
