Your letter of the 12th came teday. Thanks.

After we spake I asked Jim if he can think of any reason why Jimsy ought not answer questions he was asked in court. We thinks of none. Mowever, looking toward the future, I would suggest that these questions be prepared in advance and the questions rather than answers be ministed considered by counsel. While it is possible that Jimsy might go too far in some responses, Is doubt it. My concern is not with truthfulness because I'm confident Jimsy has been truthful and will be.

My event view on timing is that there is not any timing. This is a legitimate story contering ground unprocedented abuse of a prisoner whose charge that it is for pressure, to disuade him from pussuing his rights, did not receive even <u>pro forms</u> denial. Searthing that seemed to be without journalistic interest. Technically the warden is the respondent. Notither he nor any representative testified on any aspect, including Jimay's charges.

This steryhaddresses the rights of others. I therefore see no need to held back or to consider other factors. The seemer attention is drawn to abuses of this nature the seemer the possibility of correction. More than Jimay's rights are at issue. However, it also is possible that these hardwads might decide to treat him a bit better with seme attention to what they are and have been doing.

There seems to have been a slight delay in the beginning of the effort to everride Ford's FOI vote. The Senate seems impressed by the DI cost argument. I've made a suggestion to counter it.

I wish sewcenc who might be listened to at a place like the Sunday Times Magazine would suggest that it buy the condensation rights to Aim's analysis of how FOI worked with us.

If Bud is not in court tenerrow I'll be at his effice long before lunch so I should be able to write further by Saturday.


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
