Over at Harper's Magazine Press, a new novel by Iain Macnab was sent back to press before publication April 2. "The 42nd Year of Mrs. Charles Prescott" (\$7.95) reportedly reached the 8000-copy in-print mark.

Straight Arrow Books has ordered a first printing of 40,000 copies of its "authorized, unexpurgated" edition of Richard Anger's "Hoilywood Babylon" (May 22, \$14.95). The reissue of the classic exposé which discusses the film capital's 50year history of "violence and decadence" has been made a selection of the Playboy Book Club; rights in England have been sold to Macmillan for hardcover and to Pan for paperback reprint publication.

LITTLE, BROWN CLAIMS DEFINITIVE BOOK ON DR. KING'S ASSASSIN


Calling it the "first definitive biography" of the alleged assassin of Dr. Martin Luther King, Little, Brown reports it has scheduled the publication of "James Earl Ray: An American Life" for the fall. The book about the man who once pleaded guilty to the murder of King and now insists that he was coerced into that plea is being written by George McMillan, a former Lasker Fellow in Civil Rights and Guggenheim Fellow who has contributed civil rights articles to many national magazines.

According to Little, Brown, the assumption of the biography is that Ray committed the crime and acted alone. McMillan, says his publisher, has been preparing the book for five years and has talked at length with Ray's family, his friends, his fellow convicts, school teachers and social workers and consulted many psychiatrists about Ray's life.

A female editor in a publishing house inherits an old brownstone in Brooklyn Heights, and mysterious events occur. Sound intriguing? That's the premise of "Moncrieff," the new Gothic from Weybright and Talley's Isabelle Holland, author of "Kilgaren" and "Trelawny." The book is "her best and most exciting" to date, says Weybright and Talley, and is scheduled for early fall publication.

A major departure for popular novelist Jean Plaidy (who also writes as Victoria Holt and Philippa Carr) will be her first nonfiction book, a lavishly illustrated biography, of Mary, Queen of Scots, entitled "Fair Devil of Scotland." Putnam reports it will publish the biography in June at \$15.95. Another Plaidy first for Putnam will be "Beyond the Blue Hills" (\$8.95). Unlike most of Ms. Plaidy's novels, which usually revolve around the lives of great queens and princesses, this August release is the story of how the evils of the 18th and early 19th centuries "affected the lives of three generations of women in a world of crime and horror, dirt and luxury."

Over at Arco, two books are being issued about vehicles: "Bicycling for Fun and Health" and "Great Automobile Designs." The first title will be published on April 21 in a \$5.95 hardcover edition and in a \$3.95 paper edition and contains hints for easier riding, such as safety measures, how to select a bike, where to buy it and how to take care of it while it's helping to improve your health.
