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## Mexican Youths Get Police Offer

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 14 (AP)—After a four-month student strike and occasional bloody violence, the Mexican government has offered a broad new compromise.

The capital's mayor, Alfonso Corona del Rosal, an appointee of the President, told the students yesterday that "we understand your anxieties, many of which in my opinion are very justified."

He offered to create a commission on which student representatives would help restructure the police and limit their authority. The Student Strike Council has demanded disbandment of the riot police, who students accuse of brutality in clashes that began in July and that have left at least 50 dead.

Corona del Rosal's proposed commission was the broadest conciliatory move among several official ones, including the release of 35 students from jail. An undisclosed number remain prisoners as a result of clashes that ended before the Olympic Games opened here on Oct. 13.

The commission would include teachers (many of whom have supported students against the government), officials, student and businessmen. There was no assurance that this group would meet student demands—which also called for firing of three top police officials—but it did open a way to compromise.

An order went out today from the Strike Council for plebiscites at various schools to decide on whether to end the strike.
