Minnesota Restricts Campus Police Force

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MINNEAPOLIS, Feb. 12—
The University of Minnesota cracked down on its campus police force today to protect "privacy and political expression," and put the force under "civilian review and control."

The university regents acted in response to a report by the assistant vice president for administration which verified allegations of campus police cooperation with military surveillance agents.

University President Malcolm Moos said he will comply with the report's recommendations, which include destruction of impounding of campus police photographs and lists of participants in political and protest "events"

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Until the practice was stopped last month, the report said, "military intelligence and other government investigating agents" had access to university records and received reports and photos from campus police.

Also today the university named Wesley A. Pomeroy, 51, a former Justice Department official, to a new \$27,500 post as safety director. He will oversee the reorganization of the campus police.
