July 13 (UPI)-The founder of the militant Minister organ-ization. <u>Robert Boliver</u> De Purh who has been hiding for more than a year to avoid Federsi prosecution, was jailed today on charges of plotting a series of bank robberies to fi-nance his self-styled "last line. of defense against communism.' FBI agents arrested the 46year-old Missourian along with Walter Patrick Peyson, 27, an associate, at the small com-munity of Williamsburg, near Truth or Consequences, N.M., where De Pugh had his underground headquarters for the past several months.

The two were heavily armed, but the FBI said they were given no opportunity to resist."

They also were carrying "a quan-tity of money and ammuni-tion" and identification papers listing their aliases, Balnh Cooper for De Pugh and Hir Cooper for Peyson. The conspiracy charges

against the two grew out of the arrest of seven men in the the arrest of seven men in the Seattle area in January, 1968, in connection with the re-ported bank robbery plot. The maximum penalty on convic-tion would be five years in prison and a \$10,000 fine. De Pugit, a manufacturing chemist with headquarters at Norborne, Mo., founded the Minutemen ten years ago, and by 1961 the organization had beguin to attract attention as

by 1961 the organization had begin to attract attention as its members omduced guar-rills way training in several areas of the country. By 1964, De Pugh estimated member-ship at 26,000. In its newsletter "On Tar-get," the Minutemen appealed on Nov. 12, 1966, for conserva-tives to join the "underground army" to train as "America's last line of defense against communism."
