Dear Dan,

Glad to talk to Jeff. Sorry I wasn't home when you phoned.

From the note my wife made for me I take it you are thinking of making some use of what you told the committee and that it has no record of you at all.

You do not need the committee's permission to say or write anything you want if you use only what is your own information or what you told it.

However, in thinking of the note, it seemed to me that if you do plan to make any use you may want to make a record in writing.

If you do, and you want to for your own protection. I suggest that you write the committee's chairman or chief counsel reporting your phone call and the report to you by Shipman that there is no record. To this I would add when (and where) you were there, how you came to be there, what you were asked, by whom, and anything you volunteered.

I think you would be justified in expressing surprise that a committee of the Senate asks to speak to a citizen, particularly one of limited mobility, and then sees to it that the Senate and the country have no record at all of it. So, would you please make a check to be certain and let me know whether the records of that period are still in the committee's offices and whether or not there is anything indicating that I was questioned and what if anything was done with the information ⁺ provided.

I'd then add a very brief description of the information, a sentence or less.

I'm not able to keep up with work that is important to me so I can't go off on other things except where I can help others in ways they may not be able to get otherwise. Jeff thinks I may be able to help you with FOIA requests. If I can I'll be glad to. I think that what you told me ought to be known, ought to get attention, and the opposite should be brought to light, too. With the latter the kind of letter I suggest may be a help.
