Please tell Wayne that I intended to write him long ago, before I could forget something I have forgotten. My FOI cases have taken so much time I've had time for nothing else. And I have forgotten. The name, that is, of the man who was picked up after the sausage and eggs. But I think it was chili. It was not Youngblood. As I recall his name was Campbell. If I come across it again in the course of a tremendous amount of accumulated filing I'll let him know.

Does either of you know anything about the Vietnam vet who filed the suit that led to the police destruction of their intelligence-unit records? Or his lawyers?

A conversation with another reporter, not from that area, leads to my asking if in Bill Sartor's time or any other time any of you encountered one Morris Davis prowling around there investigating the assassination. He appears to have been long on the Sartor/McFerren/Liberto angle.
