Aide to Garrison Sees No Case, NBC Reports

NEW YORK, June 23 (AP)—The National Broadcasting Co. says New Orleans District Attorney Jim Garrison's chief private investigator recently told Sen. Robert F. Kennedy (D-N.Y.) that there was "no basis in fact and no material evidence in Garrison's case for an assassination plot against the late President Kennedy."

William H. Gurvich, the private investigator, could not be reached for comment.

Sen. Kennedy issued the following statement through a spokesman: "At Mr. Gurvich's request I spoke to him in Washington recently. I have not discussed the substance of our conversation and I think it would be inappropriate to do so now."

In a copyright interview "He, Gurvich, was asked if it published today, Newsday, the

Garden City, Long Island, newspaper, said in part:

"If the reports were true that, as some reports had it, he had told the senator that the Garrison investigation was 'a hoax,' Gurvich said, 'That is absolutely untrue. I think Mr. Garrison believes in what he is doing.'"

The account said Gurvich replied "no comment" when asked if he had told Kennedy there was no substance to the investigation.

Chichester Stamp

LONDON, June 23 (AP)—Sir Francis Chichester's round-the-world yacht Gipsy Moth IV is to be featured on a commemorative British postage stamp next month. Twice the size of the average British stamp, it also will show a tiny figure of Chichester on the yacht's deck.
