Probe of Nader Harassment Report Is Asked Post Jack Control Press International

The Justice Department was asked yesterday to investigate the reported harassment of automobile industry critic Ralph Nader, who recently appeared before a Senate subcommittee investigating auto safety. Sen. Abraham A. Ribicoff (D-Conn.), chairman of the subcommittee, called for the investigation.

Nader testified Feb. 10, criticizing car design as being unsafe. He is the author of a book, "Unsafe at Any Speed." "I feel compelled to draw

"I feel compelled to draw the attention of the Senate to a situation of grave concern... namely, an apparent attempt to harass and intimidate a subcommittee witness," Ribicoff said, citing reports of an intensive investigation of Nader by detective agencies.

Nader by detective agencies. Ribicoff cited a section of the criminal code that provides a \$55,000 fine or five years' imprisonment, or both, for threatening or intimidating a witness in any proceedi ing before a Federal agency I or in connection with any congressional inquiry or investigation.
