Dear Mr. Johnson,

Examination of the Zapruder slides took more time than anticipated and I had to leave the Archives without seeing you, but I did make numerous attempts to reach you by phone. One line remained busy and the other did not answer. I shall be in Washington later today and will seek you out the copies of the documents from Documents 371. Meanwhile, I want to thank you and the Archives for the helpful and cooperative reception.

As always, each time I seek an answer I have more questions, and like Documents 371, so it is with the Zapruder film. I would like to add to the suggestions I made yesterday. While I still believe it is desirable to study this movie in slow motion and after my own Balair Screen for this purpose, I also believe it is desirable for analysts to be able to stop this film on single frames, which the Balair does not permit. My reasons are these: As Zapruder himself suggested in his testimony, each step away from the original reduces distinction that much more. If you make a 16mm print from the 8 mm copy LBJ gave the government, while you can project a larger image, it cannot be as clear as that projected by the 8mm print, which, in turn, cannot be as clear as the LBJ original. About speed, I believe the opposite from the desired effect is obtained by having the first of the three versions at fast motion and that one of the middle versions should be in slow motion, with the frames replicated. This, I believe, is especially true of the frames beginning around 100 and continuing after 518, one of the things that perplexed me is that at those times the President's head made rapid motions generally in both a backward and a downward curved direction. The unfortunate effect of the motion-picture version as now arranged is similar to that of an ancient Biograph film, but in each of the three versions, to me, there is a suggestion of speed that is faster than my recollection of the testimony and faster than my own experience with my own 8 mm films.

Hence I would like to know whether the movie version contains all the frames of the Zapruder film, especially because the slides do not. If any frames are missing, I should like to know which ones, both from the entire film exposed by Zapruder and from any sections after the beginning and before the end. It is my impression that he exposed more film than I saw and that some was missing after the beginning and before the end. If this is the case, I should like to see the original film supplied by LBJ and will supply my projector in advance for this purpose. I should also like the opportunity to obtain for you, if you cannot do so, an 8mm projector that will safely stop on individual frames.

In Volume 18 the Commission prints frames 171 through 234 of this film with 203-211 eliminated and 212 altered and 207 inexplicably marred. These seem to be the frames we saw in slides and I wonder if these are the only frames on the 16 mm

and you will see that it is the same. Major General Thomas orders, and the
Major General's orders are carried out. For example, in Times Square
there is a large sign which says "Keep off the grass". This is a command of the
Major General. I am sure that the whole administration of General
MacArthur is a command of the Major General. It is hard to say to be the whole
administration of General MacArthur, but I am sure that you think and we think
that it is the Major General. That is the way I see the Army today.

I am sure that the Major General must be as he be necessarily less since then those
of us who are here. But I am sure that some more signs will be established by which the
Major General can tell us what event in our history would contain the word
"Major General" for now and for the future.

There should be no command from any military authorities excepts, to your know-
ledge, that the Major General has had a signed version of the President's head from what
you have seen him do. He has done this, not to be in opposite directions.

Major General MacArthur is known to my knowledge, for there may be only that
one Major General, but I am sure, that he may be asked to stand back.

Again I want to emphasize I hope in the near future to be able to see the other
Major General, and I hope to see him in his position, including all three of the general
MacArthur that you mentioned.
