Dear Dr. Rhoads:

This is to tell you that I know enough about the transcript of the executive session of the Warren Commission of January 27, 1964, to express the opinion that it cannot in its antirety be denied me for the reason specified. I herewith renew my request for it. If there is any part of it that you withhold, I think, because of the knowledge I have, it is only fair to ask you to itemize the subjects discussed.

It is obvious that what was provided me that purports to be a verbatim transcript of the executive session of September 18, 1964, is not that and was not prepared by the until-then official seporter. After the first paragraph it is in the form of minutes. I respectfully renew my request for the stemographic transcript of this executive session.

Because of the misarrangement of these transcripts as supplied to me, in no order whatscever, I would appreciate a list of all the sessions on which those that are denied are also indicated.
