Dear Mr. Carter,

Because of what is in my reflected in your letter of September 17, the fact that I have filed a civil action in the courts, * this immediate response, your letter having just arrived.

Please, I believe delaying any response to an appeal for three months is to make a sham of any open ended process, especially when public interest is at issue, and most of all when the subject is the assassination of a President and its official investigation. In addition, I believe it violates the spirit and intent of the law, if not its letter.

However, because there was no response, I am forced to file this suit. It was forth with I submitted this, and I think I am entitled to have. Your letter appears to me to have been written for the taking of a record to which this might later be referenced. Whether or not the record is faithful, accurate or complete.

If you don't mind, I delayed the filing of this suit for a long time. My unsuccessful efforts to obtain that it took over or longer and, to be, a silly donation. Nonetheless, because of my purposes are meaningful research (not say I, nor the government, conceive it) and publishing, not the advancement of the government, I would be happy to move forward if the suit once its purposes are accomplished. That are not the set forth in your letter. If this is not done, I will proceed with the action. I have been very then patient in the face of the most transparent delaying tactics and lateness from both my ability to respond and write. While I have no desire to embarrass the government in court, I have even less desire to be party to any further delays. The decision will be the government's and I hope it will be communicated to me expeditiously.

It is pretty conspicuous last year letter was not written in the normal course of events. It was written after I filed this suit and after I wrote letters to the National Archives seeking this one picture, to which there has not yet been response. If you or however will write the decision, if any, direct and rapid to, I suspect take to face. I will not damage any pictures with whom ever they come from and vice versa.

If you should prefer an expedited settlement of this matter I suggest it may be more readily accomplished if self-explanatory and descriptive in case (nothing is put as internal or area unimportant by you) are furnished alike.
