Re: O at Sportsdrome Range, Grand Prairie
Par 4: "During the time he was at the range, a total of about 15 minutes,

he only fired 10 rounds at his target, and after firing each round, he would take the spent cartridge out by hand. I got the impression he was saving the empty cases to re-load them"

Wood later examined the targets. Of this "Oswald" he said, "had the best target of the 13 targets I looked at. He had 8 out of 10 rounds in the "bulls-eye" and the other two rounds were right near the "bulls-eye".

Distance, 100 yds. Bullseye, 4-5 " diameter. Dated 12/4/63. Witness, SS Agt John J. Giuffre (right) Date incident, about 11/16/63, 3 pm.

12/5/63 SS Rept, Burke, Detroit from Kelley, Dallas, "Alleged Photographs portraying President Kennedy's head wounds", quotes Eva Grant: "She understands that the FBI is aware of these photographs and are in possession of prints". Of the photos, "Earl Ruby has information to the effect that photographs had been taken of President Kennedy as he was being taken into Parkland Hospital on a stretcher and that the photographs showed large head wounds with part of the skull missing." 87-4: 484

Truly's version of Baker-Oswald: 87-4:419, p. 4 (SS 12/7 12/7/63, Artgur W. Blake): "As Mr. Truly started up the stairway from the second second to the third floor he noticed that the patrolman was not with him and, at the same time, he heard the patrolman say something. Mr. Truly returned to the second floor and saw the patrolman standing at the doorway leading into the lunchroom, with his pistol drawn and pointed at Oswald, who was then just inside the lunchroom near the doorway. The Patrolman asked Mr. Truly if he worked in the building and Mr. Truly replied "Yes'." Truly's recollection of O's clothing "dressed in light colored clothing and probably a T-shirt".

This SS report begins with this from the synopsis: "All employees who work in the building and who were present at work on November 22, 1963, have been interviewed as set forth below, and written statements taken from those who were able to furnish pertinent information concerning the assassination."

On page 5: With regard to the boxes of books which were stacked in a disorderly fashion near the sixth floor window from which the shots were fired, Mr. Truly advised that several of his regular employees were engaged in laying

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a new plywood floor on the sixth floor and had temporarily moved these boxes of books to clear an area in which they were working."

Shelley spoke well of Oswald, including his performance. Last saw him 11:50 a.m. "It is Mr. Shelley's recollection that Oswald was wearing khaki trousers and a T-shirt".

Eddie Piper "At about 12:00 noon on November 22, 1963, Piper last saw Oswald on the first floor and at that time Oswald said, 'I'm going to eat lunch.' Piper stated that he ate lunch on the first floor and was still ~~there~~ on that floor at the time of the shots, that he looked up at the clock, and it was 12:25 P.M. Piper did not see Oswald again." Note that this does not indicate where Piper ate his lunch, whether he could or did see the other places where people could or did eat, etc.

The next statement of Charles D. Givens says that at 11:45 Oswald asked him to return the elevator to the 6th floor, not inconsistent with Piper's statement that at 12:00 he saw O on the first floor. "It is Givens's recollection that Oswald was wearing a brown shirt, when he last saw him."

Lovelady: said Oswald was a wise guy". No reflection of his having been asked where he was when motorcade passed, what he was wearing.

Bonie Willims: "one of the employees who had moved boxes of books on the sixth floor on the morning of November 22, 1963, in connection with clearing an area preparatory to ~~the~~ laying the new floor." Neither he nor Jarman heard the shells hit the floor or the action of the bolt.

Norman gave an affidavit saying "I also saw some dust fall from the ceiling of the fifth floor..." (491) 12/4/63

folio 512. SS Agt Roger C. Warren, 12/6/63: "Preliminary investigation indicates that Officer Tippit was shot three times, one bullet piercing the head and two bullets the chest." Not late date for "preliminary" info on Tippit's murder.

Same report: On December 5, 1963, I interviewed Lr. Baker, Homicide Division, Dallas Police Department, who stated from his official records that at 7:03 P.M. on November 22, 1963, murder charges were filed against Lee Harvey Oswald for the murder of Officer Tippit. Also, at 11:30 P.M. on November 22, 1963, charges were filed against Oswald for the assassination of President Kennedy."

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12/3/63 Kunkle, SS fol 531. Davis, Starts Drome Range, told him that he had given FBI all empty shells save those collected about 11/12 by A.R. Papuurt t at the Barr's Gun Shop. Davis found 3 6.5 she gave the set to the Reporting Agent who gave them to FBI, Hosty. Last 537

From p. 4 of 457A: "On February 29, 1964, Billy Nolan Lovelady was photographed by Special Agents of the FBI at Dallas, Texas. On this occasion, Lovelady advised that on the day of the assassination of President John. F. Kennedy, November 22, 1963^m at the time of the assassination, and shortly before, he was standing in the doorway of the front entrance to the TSBD where he is employed. He stated he was wearing a red and white vertical striped shirt and blue jeans."

Doc 7 12/4/63 Part Ood 7, Gemberling's report folio 12 , on Zapruder "He stated that this camera was fully wound, was set, manually, on Mximum zoom lens. The camera was set to take normal speed movie film or 24 frames per second." Also "he knew from watching through the viewfinder that the President had been hit."
