On September 14, 1964, Jack A. Lawrence, 204 Ninth Avenue, South Charleston, Wost Va, was reinterviewed and advised fliat he did not know and had never seen Lee Harvey Oswald. He sold that the day after the assassination of President Kennedy, a group of salesmen at Downtown Lincoln-Mercury. in Dallas, Texas, including Mr. BOOARD, Mr. PIZZO, himself and others, were standing around listening to a radio in the salesroom when the news that Oswald had been arrested ?!" for the assassination came over the air. When the name . Oswald was spoken, Mr. Bogard said Oswald was the man who had been in the Downtown Lincoln-Mercury about ten days before to look at cars and was to return later concerning buying one.
