Rubbish Analysis

LANTANA, Fla. — Results of The National Enquirer's July 8 rubbish raid at the Georgetown home of Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger were reported yesterday by the weekly newspaper in its July 29 edition.

The Enquirer said the contents of the Kissinger trash bags included:

- "Detailed" work schedules for the agents on duty at Kissinger's home and the names of most of the agents assigned to him.
- A memo revealing that the Secret Service is testing a new code light signal for all its limousines.
- A handwritten note on the back of an activity report that gave the number and type of arms and ammunitions carried in each Secret Service limousine.
- A handwritten document indicating that the Secret Service had left a shotgun behind during Kissinger's trip to the Virgin Islands last month. It asked for another shotgun, the Enquirer said.
- "Dozens" of handwritten and typed documents that listed Kissinger's travel schedules, some of which referred to him by the Secret Service code name for the Secretary of State.

A Secret Service spokesman told The Washington Post yesterday that the agency knew of The Enquirer's story, but said, "We are not aware as to exactly what material they have." He added that the agency had "no general comment" about the report.

Enquirer reporter Jay Gourley retrieved five bags of trash from in front of the Kissingers' home shortly after midnight on July 8. He said he refused when a

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Secret Service agent asked him to return the trash, and that the agent then asked if Gourley had ever been in "an insane asylum." Two days later Gourley returned the plastic garbage bags and their perishable contents, keeping the non-perishable material for review.

The State Department said the action "caused grave anguish to Mrs. Kissinger and the Secretary is really revolted by what he considers a violation of the privacy of his house."

In addition to the Secret Service documents, the Enquirer said other refuse recovered from the Kissingers' trash bags included:

- An empty prescription envelope from the State Department pharmacy. The envelope had contained the tranquilizer Seconal, and had been prescribed for one of the Kissingers by Dr. Carl Nydell, a State Department physician, the newspaper said. The Enquirer said Dr. Nydell refused to discuss the matter.
- An engraved invitation to a July 5 luncheon at the White House from First Lady Betty Ford to Kissinger's wife, Nancy.
- A shopping list for a case of Jack Daniel's Black Label, a case of Ezra Brooks and a case of Cabin Still, all whisky.

The Enquirer article said some of the trash revealed the presence of the Kissinger family pet, a

dog. Several Secret Service documents bore teth marks and Gourley said he found a badly chewed seat cushion and a gnawed ballpoint pen.
