To accompany Randy Fitzgerald's article on the National Enquirer's Wash-ington connection ("A Tabloid Romances Washington," Aug. 6), we ran a photo of President Gerald Ford reading a copy of the Enquirer, with this caption: "No one seems to know where the original is of this photooriginal is of this photo-graph, reprinted from the National Enquirer . . . Since then we have learned that the original photo apparently appeared earlier this year in the Sunday Spectator of Hornell, N.Y., located near the country home of Henry O. Dormann the former Enquirer execu tive whose romancing of Washington politicos is at least partly responsible for the paper's present success. The Spectator pictured Dor-mann showing President Ford a copy of the Enquirer during a visit to the Oval Office. Apparently Dormann, who orchestrated a promo-tional film narrated by Chet Huntley and featuring laudatory comments about the Enquirer from Senators Mark Hatfield, Frank Church and Barry Goldwater and Rep. Shirley Chisholm, once again lived up to Fitzgerald's characterization of him as a "flamboyant publicist": it would seem the En-quirer cropped Dormann quirer cropped Dormann from the photo and ran the picture of Ford with the headline, "President and Mrs. Gerald Ford belong to the Enquirer's wonderful, ever-growing family of read-ers."

According to Fitzgerald, "Ford found himself suck-ered into promoting the Enquirer with alarming regular-ity."
